

I want to take this opportunity to thank everyone for a wonderful first four months of the school year and to extend warm wishes for a restful and blessed Christmas surrounded by loved ones. As we begin 2024 we are quickly approaching the midpoint of the school year. Towards the end of January our junior high students will be preparing for midterms and final exams. At this time I would like to share with you a prayer for children at school that was recently shared with me. This prayer really resonated with me as a parent and as an educator and I have found myself coming back to it regularly during the lead up to Christmas. I hope you find it as profound and insightful as I do.

For my Children at School Lord, as I gaze upon these children, I feel inadequate. Can I rise to the challenge of loving them into adulthood? Please help me to: Give this child reasons to believe I am trustworth. Offer this child more time than luxuries. Teach this child why something is wrong rather than giving them a rule. Give this child the words "please", "thank you", and "sorry" and the ability to use them. Paint this child a lasting memory of me smiling. Be courageous enough to say "no" sometimes so this child feels safe. Teach hope and patience by not giving them everything they want. Show this child the hurt they can cause so that they learn to be compassionate. Demonstrate pleasure in the ordinary things so that they feel easily content. Talk naturally to you in front of them so that they learn how to pray. Show them how easy it is to pick up litter rather than complaining about it. Care for other people so that they learn to be just. Allow them to grow up at their own pace so they learn to enjoy themselves. Give them enough freedom not to feel afraid of the world. Navigate social media with them so they can make good choices. Teach them your goodness so that they begin to enjoy you. Respond to them with mercy first and judgment second. Give them confidence that love brought them into the world. Show them that I love and respect their parents and grandparents.

When I fail to be the leader I should be, forgive me, guide me, and inspire me to do better. Thank you for the trust you have placed in giving us this child, your gift to our lives.

Re-Registration Starts January 15, 2024

Families with students currently enrolled in our system should expect an email during the week of January 15-19, 2024 asking that the online "Registration Update Form" be completed for each child attending one of our schools in the 2024/2025 school year.

Parents/guardians who are hoping to register younger siblings new to the division will also have the opportunity to do this at the same time that they re-register older students.

New Student Registration Starts February 1, 2024

All Early Learning to Grade 12 students who are new to the division and wish to enroll for the 2024/2025 school year are invited to register online starting on Thursday, February 1, 2024.

Our finances must always reflect our values. To support excellence in learning and ensure that all students receive the opportunities to become the persons God created them to be, financial allocations must support a maximum allotment of dollars to the classroom and equity in the distribution of these dollars.

St. Martin de Porres 1579-1639 (Feast Day: November 3)

Martin de Porres was born in Lima, Peru in 1579. His father, a Spanish nobleman, abandoned the family, and so Martin was raised by his mother, a former enslaved person from Panama. Martin grew up in poverty and eventually became an apprentice to a barbersurgeon. During this time, there was prejudice and discrimination against those of mixed racial heritage, which made Martin's life very difficult. This even extended to the religious life, as he was not allowed to become a full member of a religious order and could serve only as a lay volunteer.

Martin, however, was not deterred by this discrimination. He joined the Dominicans as a volunteer, taking on kitchen work, cleaning, and laundry in addition to his barbering so that he could live in the religious community. He considered all of this work to be holy, and during this time many miracles occurred. At the age of 34, Martin was placed in charge of the infirmary, where he cared for both the sick of the Dominicans as well as the larger community of Lima. He was known for his patience and compassion in this role. During his life he also was well known for the collection of funds to serve the poor and hungry, and he also founded a residence for orphans in Lima. He was also well known for his care for animals, and is often shown with them in his imagery. When he was canonized in 1962, he became the first black saint of the Americas.

"Building" In Our Schools

This past month, our Holy Spirit Catholic School Division joined together to celebrate the season of Advent through our Advent Blessing videos. For each week of Advent, a video was created that included a Gospel reading, reflection, artwork, and music, all provided by students within the Holy Spirit Catholic School Division. The videos were a shining representation of staff and students joining together in remembrance and celebration of the arrival of Jesus, and in the hope of his return.



Corporal Works of Mercy – Give Drink to the Thirsty –

While often connected to Feed the Hungry, the Corporal Work of Giving Drink to the Thirsty is actually a separate work. If we think about the context of Christ's time, we recognize the scarcity and importance of water in the arid land He inhabited (something we know about in our area as well!). Water is often referred to in scripture, both in concrete and spiritual ways. If we think about the concrete action of giving drink to another, we can see in it a gracious act of hospitality, a thoughtful expression of love, and a desire to seek the good of the other. We all know the importance of water to our bodies, how clean water impacts health, and how access to water is limited, not just in far away places but also very close to home.

Consider one of the following practical suggestions from the USCCB:

- We take it for granted that we have access to clean water. Donate to help build wells for water for those in need.
- Organize a group to collect bottled water to distribute at a shelter for families.
- Make an effort not to waste water. Remembering to turn off the water faucet when you are brushing your teeth or washing dishes can help, especially in regions suffering from drought.

Pope's Prayer Intentions - For the Gift of Diversity in the Church Let us pray that the Spirit help us recognize the gift of different charisms within the Christian community, and to discover the richness of different ritual traditions in the heart of the Catholic Church.

Catholic Social Teaching - Preferential Option for the Poor -

Through the course of this year, we will look each month at one of the Catholic Social Teachings. The aim of Catholic Social Teaching is to shine the light of the Gospel on our contemporary world, allowing us as disciples of Christ to look at the world around us with new eyes, and to take action.

Last month, we looked at participation - the belief that each person is entitled to participate in making decisions that affect their lives. This supports subsidiarity, the dignity of the human person, and the pursuit of the common good.

This month, we are considering the Option for the Poor and Vulnerable, also known as the Preferential Option for the Poor. As Development and Peace Canada suggests,

The moral test of any society is based on how the most vulnerable people are treated. God loves all people, but prioritizes and calls us to a unique concern for the poor.

Throughout scripture, we see constantly that God is keenly interested in those at the margins, and He calls us to live in solidarity with them, prioritizing their needs so that they can fully participate in society and have hope for a better future. Each of our recent Popes, St. John Paul II, Pope Benedict XVI, and Pope Francis, have written extensively about this - and we see it constantly lived out by the saints, including St. Martin de Porres.

What is one thing Jesus' disciples did then that we can still do today to help people know and follow Jesus?




